Possessive pronoun: who owns a

noun (his, her, our, your, their, its, my)

information about the noun (who, whom, whose, which, what)

TYPES OF NOUNS

Proper nouns: names, places, days
(Harry Kane, London, Monday)

Common nouns: items (table, ball)

Collective nouns: groups of people or things (team, choir, herd)

Abstract nouns: ideas, qualities or conditions (danger, happiness, friendship)

TYPES OF ADVERBS

Manner: how - happily, slowly,
sadly, carefully, hopefully

Place: where - everywhere,
towards, downhill, upwards

Time: when - immediately, now,
yesterday, soon

Frequency: how often? - always,
twice, frequently
